

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I am writing with thoughts of a *Hydro International Insider's View* given last November, 2003 by the Deputy Port Hydrographer of the Port of London and chair of FIG Commission 4, Mr. Adam Greenland. The article entitled "Houses Divided Against Itself Cannot Stand" called for closer co-operation between national hydrographic societies in areas such as standards, education and training, joint publications, conferences and seminars. When one considers that there are numerous conferences, publications and training endeavours all competing for a relatively small, albeit international, hydrographic community, I believe Mr. Greenland couldn't

be more correct. Add to this the geomatics market in general and we've got a lot of member associations and publications vying for our subscriptions. I believe a recent example of "houses divided" could be cited in a case where enrollment in this year's offering of the Multibeam Training Course at CHC2004 was significantly down because The Hydrographic Society of America hosted two offerings during 2003.

On the subject of education and training, I have seen Canada slip and slide over the past 15 years to the point where our training institutions can no longer produce accredited hydrographic personnel. In government we have been taking graduates from non-surveying/engineering programs, putting them on a 3 week crash course in (when available) and labeling hydrography hydrographers. This is not only a disservice to our profession but also to those individuals seeking bona fide careers as hydrographers. The issue just begins at the technical level as management positions within the CHS are sometimes staffed by non-hydrographic personnel. I'm not here to point the finger - yet, but in this regard, I believe more emphasis has to be placed on the fact that hydrography is international and one nation cannot operate inside a vacuum in-so-far as how and when it chooses to recognize (or ignore) well established international standards. Government aside, I know of some "Offshore Surveyors" who object to being called "Hydrographic Surveyors". These individuals should realize that they are only serving to "divide a house" which is already very specialized within the surveying/engineering community. Nationally, CHA is cooperating with the Association of Canada Lands Surveyors in an endeavour to raise the profile of hydrographers as surveying/mapping professionals with a view to establishing a national certification program for hydrographers.

So what I am getting at here is the need for the CHA, who (I hope) helps contribute to the well-being of the Canadian hydrographic community, to get better connected with the international community and therefore better connect our people with international values and expertise in hydrography. It has been my intention that strengthening our affiliation with the Canadian Institute of Geomatics (Canada's National Surveying and Mapping Institution) would better serve to connect us with organizations like FIG. Historically, there has been a lot of hydrography and not so much of CIG's other commissions showing up at FIG meetings so perhaps a direct membership in FIG (Commission 4) might serve the same purpose?

As for us autonomous hydrographic societies, referred to by Mr. Greenland, I believe we can all benefit from federating

under one banner. Imagine one point of reference for hydrographic news, employment, education, conferences workshops and seminars, etc. On this front, I believe both Hydro International and the International Federation of Hydrogaphic Societies have been doing an excellent Given the choice however, I see the IFHS (www.hydrographicsociety.org/) to be the best conduit and the Hydrographic Society Journal (which CHA have been promoting through Lighthouse for many years) to be the publication. For \$25 in additional dues, CHA members would receive the HS Journal on a quarterly basis plus receive the HS's Annual Diary. The cost is a fraction of what you would pay for an individual membership to the Hydrographic Society and you would be supporting an organization which indeed 'gives back' to the international hydrographic community through various special publications and on-line information. -Andrew
